Prior to becoming superintendent at Howard-Winneshiek, he served in other administrative roles in Minnesota: elementary principal in Inver Grove Heights, MN; associate high school principal in Roseville, MN; and assistant high school principal and dean of students in Farmington, MN. Equine Therapy Program Coming to Indianola CSD

ndianola CSD School Board has approved a pilot program with Barnum Center at Wesley Woods in partnership with Stavig Counseling Services, LLC to offer an afterschool relational, mental, emotional and social health program for children in the middle and high schools. The pilot is being funded with mental health grant dollars and will utilize equine therapy.

People often feel like they are at the mercy of their bodies because they do not have the skills necessary to regulate and be in control of themselves. The ability to develop a relationship with a horse provides the individual a safe relationship in which to begin to explore their patterns and how their patterns impact themselves and others. Horses respond and react to what is happening in the present moment. Horses do not have the capability to make comparisons or do much thinking about the past, present and future.

Working with a horse allows a person to change a thought, belief, feeling, or behavior and get an immediate, honest

response from the horse. Making changes in human relationships does not offer this same type of immediate, honest feedback since humans are often thinking about past behaviors or potential future consequences. This constant and immediate feedback from the horse is non-judgmental and increases an individual's self-awareness, allowing them to be more emotionally and physically connected to their body. When an individual is aware of what they are doing and how they are in the present moment, the individual is more mindful, less anxious and less fearful. The person has the opportunity to make changes in the way they are behaving in relationships with others.



This pilot program will target a small group of up to six Indianola community middle and/or high school students at a time. Participating students are to be identified by school counselors and the school-based mental health therapist. Students will participate in an equine assisted learning and activities program which is expected to have therapeutic benefits for participants. A Natural Lifemanship Institute trained, licensed mental health professional and staff will lead small group activities in a relational, recreational setting on-site at Barnum Center @ Wesley Woods Camp and Retreat Center.

The goal of the program is to teach, model, mentor and grow skills using trauma informed care based on the Natural

Lifemanship Institute relationship building principles in a small relational group setting:

- To help students learn to regulate their nervous system by teaching one or more coping/brain/body regulation skills each week. (education pieces will be sent home to parents by email or with participants)
- To practice and model these skills each week while working with horses and humans.
- Participants/parents/teachers will report improvement or growth in mental, emotional, social, and relational health of the participant.

Over the course of the 2021-2022 school year, Indianola Middle School counselors have implemented a variety of new activities focused on students' social emotional health, college and career readiness, and academic achievement. These activities include:

- LUNCH BUNCH GROUPS: Small groups of grade-level students focusing on building connections among peers and adults
- XELLO: College and Career Readiness software
- PLEASE PASS THE LOVE: Stomp Out Stigma group empowers students to make positive changes in our school climate through student-led initiatives
- MVP: (Mentors in Violence Prevention) a research-based program that teaches students to challenge and change social, cultural and institutional norms that support abusive behavior
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- LEADERSHIP/FRIENDSHIP GROUP: Led by Employee and Family Resources (EFR) utilizes the Youth Connection curriculum, a research-based program that is designed to increase resilience and protective factors in children and youth
- HIGH SCHOOL MENTORS: Connecting with middle school students
- **REFLECTION ROOM:** Area of the building located outside of the counselor's office designed to encourage students to utilize coping strategies to build resilience and self-regulation.
